WASECA — Six hundred Waseca County children, birth to 12th grade, will receive Christmas gifts through Santa Anonymous this year. Each child will receive one piece of clothing, one toy or age appropriate item, one book, one family game and a stocking stuffer in addition to

handmade quilts for many. Between now and Dec. 22, parents who live in the county and have met income guidelines will shop by appointment in the Santa Anonymous "store" in the back room of the Waseca Area Neighborhood Service Center.

"I know when you can give back, you will," NSC program manager Cindy Coy tells those who receive gifts for their children at Christ-

Volunteers helping to make the program possible are Wendy Hansen of New Richland and Beth Krause of Waseca who buy and organize the gifts in preparation for shopping, enlisting eight of their friends for help.

Thursday, Hansen and Krause sorted quilts by size and made space for the toys,
